Alii, and greetings from the people and government of the Republic of Palau!

It's been a difficult year globally. We are faced with many challenges such as the COVID-19 pandemic, threats to our ocean's health, climate change and economic recovery and security. And like Japan, Palau has limited natural resources, but we recognize and acknowledge that we need our biggest and most important resource, our people, to address these issues.

Yet, these setbacks have not shaken the indomitable spirit of the people of Palau and Japan; rather our common challenges have drawn us even closer together, strengthening our friendship and cooperation.

As has been highlighted throughout our commitment together, Palau and Japan's alliance is based on our mutual belief in demo-

cratic principles, respect for human rights and our allegiance to the rule of law. These are the facets that forge the bedrock of our coalition.

Japan's commitment was further demonstrated during the Ninth Pacific Islands Leaders Meeting (PALM9) held virtually due to the pandemic, when it launched the Pacific Bond (Kizuna) Policy — strengthening ties between Japan and Pacific island countries and reaffirming the Indo-Pacific region's vital role in the international arena.

PALM9 also produced a leaders declaration and a joint action plan calling for regional cooperation and collaboration to address shared challenges.

On the eve of Palau's 27th anniversary of independence, I wish to note that Japan was there on that historic day of Oct. 1, 1994, when Palau raised its flag and declared to the world its emergence as an independent country. Just hours later, Japan signed diplomatic notes signifying its recognition of Palau's political evolution, becoming the second nation to do so.

Today, just shy of its third decade as a member of the international community,

Palau counts Japan among its closest and steadfast allies.

I pledge to work with the new prime minister in addressing the myriad challenges confronting our people and further strengthen our bilateral engagement. I'm especially keen to reinvigorate our people-to-people exchanges to bolster Palau's tourism sector — our bread-and-butter industry. In a few months, Palau and Japan will celebrate the completion of the Palau International Airport's public-private partnership renovation project, the first of its kind in the region. With its opening and management conducted by a leading Japanese aviation firm, Palau hopes to welcome more visitors from Japan.

Allow me to avail of this opportunity to extend Palau's appreciation for Japan's

contributions to the seventh Our Ocean Conference slated for February 2022, and to formally extend my invitation for Japan to join me and like-minded world leaders at this important event.

I look forward to a personal meeting with the prime minister at the soonest opportunity, an occasion we will utilize to highlight the framework of our bilateral cooperation once again.

Finally, I extend my profound well wishes to the continued well-being of the people and government of Japan and join my fellow Palauans in extending an invitation to the growing Japanese community in Palau to join us on Oct. 1 to commemorate and celebrate Palau's 27th Independence Day.

Constructive cooperation seen in a variety of areas

Today, the 27th Independence Day of Palau, on behalf of our newly elected President Surangel S. Whipps Jr., Minister of State Gustav Aitaro and the government and people of Palau, I relay warm greetings

to Their Imperial Majesties Emperor Naruhito and Empress Masako, Prime Minister Yoshihide Suga and the government and good people of Japan. We also extend our best wishes for good health to Emperor Emeritus Akihito and Empress Emerita Michiko, who honored Palau and all our people with a historic visit on April 8 and 9, 2015.

Even under the dark cloud of COVID-19,

we celebrated notable landmarks. Foremost was the delayed but successful 2020 Tokyo Summer Olympics and Paralympics, with appreciation to Hamatomo Kanko Co. for donating training wear and training gear to Team Palau, and to Mayor Hideto Murakami of the town of Zao, Miyagi Prefecture, and Mayor Sadayuki Suzuki of the city of Hitachiomiya, Ibaraki Prefecture, for being our host towns. We also commemorated 25 years of Palau-Mie Prefecture sister-state relations.

We greatly appreciate Suga for co-chairing the ninth Pacific Islands Leaders Meeting, which was held by videoconference on July 2. The leaders declaration reiterated cooperation embedded in our joint action plan toward the COVID-19 pandemic, ocean sustainability and maritime security, climate change countermeasures and economic and human resource development.

Looking ahead, Palau will host the seventh Our Ocean Conference on Feb. 16 and 17 next year, which will coincide with a full moon as depicted on the national flag on the 17th.

To achieve Palau's target of having 45% of its energy provided by renewable sources by 2025, we are collaborating with Tsuneishi Facilities & Craft Co. on Japan's Green Hydrogen initiative to support the development of hydrogen-powered generators and inter-island boats. Additionally, with Oita Prefecture's T-Plan Inc., we are working on a plan to introduce solar- and battery-powered electric vehicles in the ecotourism sector.

The nongovernmental organization Peace Winds Japan, in partnership with the Palau government, is poised to support primary health care, including the prevention of non-communicable diseases. This project will provide and make use of a 34-meter ship from early 2022 to deliver *kenshin* (health-screening) services to remote islands.

As the end of my eight-year posting approaches, I appreciate and experience anew the fulfilling challenges and opportunities toward deepened relations of peace and friendship with Japan, our host country.

Best wishes to the next ambassador for

success. I am optimistic that our bilateral relations will build further on our history of close ties.

As we celebrate this 27th anniversary of our independence, I extend warm greetings and best wishes to Their Imperial Majesties Emperor Naruhito and Empress Masako.

On this occasion I express our gratitude to the government and people of Japan for a wide range of assistance extended to Palau over the years, which has contributed to the remarkable development and progress we have made since our independence in 1994.

The people of Palau and Japan are connected by shared history, values and our belief in the fundamental democratic principles underlying our form of government. Our heritage is greatly influenced by Japanese as so many of our people are Japanese descendants, and Palau was the headquarters of the South Seas Agency under Japanese administration. Another notable form is the long-standing collaboration Japan and Palau have conducted through cultural and people-to-people exchange programs. Another aspect is the student exchanges between Japan and Palau, which have allowed participants to experience living in different cultures. This brief cross-cultural experience gives participants priceless and lasting memories, and all these contribute to the further strengthening of

relations between our countries.

With the formulation of the Pacific Islands Leaders Meeting and Governors' Meeting (PALM & G), governors from various prefectural governments in Japan have been included as part of the PALM process. This new arrangement opens vast opportunities for exchanges and collaboration with new partners, and I am eager to expand Palau's engagement to the prefectural governments to initiate new relations.

Again, my warmest greetings with gratitude to the government and people of Japan for standing by our side over the past 27 years.

The 2019-2020 Japan-Palau Goodwill Yacht Race was held from Yokohama to Palau in celebration of the 25th anniversary of independence and the establishment of diplomatic relations between Palau and Japan. This race was

unique, with seven yachts and a support sailing vessel arriving safely after approximately 10 days at sea. Research on microplastics was conducted during the voyage through the collection of water samples, and the Japan Agency for Marine-Earth Science and Technology has recently published its report on its discoveries. The 2023-2024 Japan-Palau Goodwill Yacht Race is being planned to continue this new tradition to promote yachting and relations between Palau and Japan.

In addition, a program to invite Palau youths to learn to sail and hold a friendship race with youths in Japan was also initiated in 2019. The youths have continued their training since, and a friendship race is being planned for early next year.

Bilateral relations between Palau and Japan are deepening year by year.

As the honorary consul general of Palau in Yokohama and president of Fujiki Transportation & Stevedoring Co., I am keen to provide my knowledge and experience in port operations, transportation, logistics, tourism and hospitality to contribute to Palau's development.
